The Problem

Food Insecurity is a Major Problem in Cincinnati

- The demand for food has increased 60% since the COVID pandemic
- 270,000 neighbors currently food insecure



OUR COMMUNITY'S CHALLENGE

For ten years, we've seen a steady increase in the demand for food and support services and have outgrown what our current operations are equipped to meet. In that time, we have gone from distributing just 7 million meals to nearly 34 million meals, yet we're 13 million meals short of meeting the need in our community — a gap we only expect to widen as we face the long-term impacts of the COVID-19 crisis. But, this is a challenge we can—and should—do something about. Together, we can close the hunger gap.





The Solution



A Multi-Campus FOCUS Center:

- At least one weekly hot meal at main FOCUS Center
- Food pantry open several times a week at main FOCUS Center
- Smaller food pantries in satellite in churches across Cincinnati


